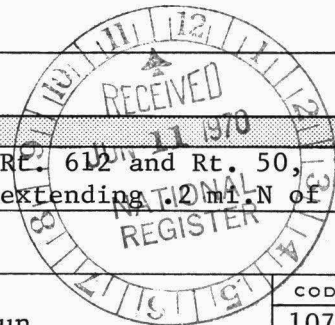

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Aldie is picturesquely located in the gap of the Little River at the northern end of the Bull Run Mountains. The mill and the miller's house are on the south side of the Lee-Jackson Memorial Highway (originally the Little River Turnpike), while the Mercer House stands on a knoll overlooking the highway from the north. The mill is a three-part complex, having a two-story center section (with two additional levels beneath the broad gable roof) flanked by a one-story section on the east and a two-story section on the west. The center section is connected to the flanking sections by one-story brick and frame hyphens with shed roofs. All three major parts of the mill are laid in American bond on stone foundations. The west section is distinguished by diamond-shaped header-brick patterns between the second floor windows. The wooden portions of the mill include hand-hewn chamfered beams and chestnut door frames. Much of the mill's original machinery survives, including the imported burrstones of French flint. The elevated millrace behind the mill originally fed water to the no-longer functioning twin overshot mill wheels. The two-story brick miller's house is located between the millrace and the Little River, just behind the mill. The house has been enlarged with an extensive rear ell.

The Mercer House, on the opposite side of the road, originally had a full view of the mill from its elevated location, but the view is now obscured by trees. The stuccoed brick house has been considerably altered inside and out, and has several later additions that generally conform to the Federal style of the original portion of the house. The house is currently T-shaped in plan, with later additions between the arms of the T, and a two-story addition on the north end of the house. A much altered and enlarged outbuilding stands to the north of the house. What appears to be an old frame smokehouse is located just behind the house.

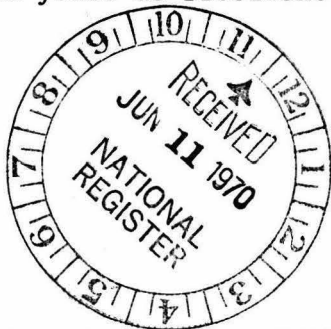

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In 1803, Charles Fenton Mercer, noted military officer and legislator, settled near the Little River in the lower part of Loudoun County, where he began his law practice. On a hill above the point where the Little River Turnpike crossed the river, Mercer built a two-story brick house to serve as the residence for his estate. He named his estate Aldie Manor after Aldie Castle in Scotland, the seat of the Mercer family from which he believed himself descended. In 1804, Mercer obtained legal rights to erect a mill dam on the Little River, as well as the right to raise the water of the river for the purpose of erecting a mill. A large brick grist mill was put up by Mercer's slaves soon thereafter. A small village grew up near the mill, and in 1810 it was officially named Aldie in honor of Mercer's estate.

Aldie Mill survives as one of the most handsomely outfitted and best-preserved mills in Virginia. Its twin overshot wheels are thought to be a unique feature in Virginia mill construction. The mill is still in operation, and the present owner and miller is the great-great-grandson of Mercer's own miller. It is said that Aldie Mill ground grain for James Monroe when he lived at nearby Oak Hill. The mill, along with the miller's house and the manor house form an unusually complete early-nineteenth century mill complex in an especially picturesque setting.

Aldie Mill's significance is enhanced by the distinguished career of its founder. During the War of 1812, Mercer was made brigadier-general of militia in command of the forces at Norfolk. He was a member of the Virginia House of Delegates from 1810 to 1817, during which time he brought forward a bill for construction of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal. In 1817 he was elected to the United States Congress, where he became an outspoken opponent of the African slave trade. An ardent abolitionist, Mercer served for several years as President of the American Colonization Society.

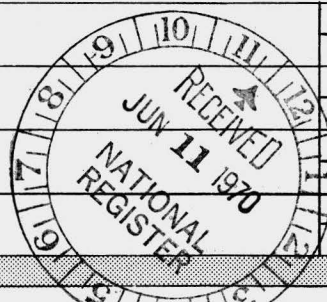
